LATER FROM EUROPE

Arrival of the Arabia at Halifax. No hair... Cotton and Breadstuffs advanced... HALIFAX, April 25, 1854.

The Royal Mail Steamship Arabia, Capt. Jenkins from Liverpool on Saturday the 19th inst. arrived here at one o'clock this morning.

April 19, 6 P. M. lat. 49, lon. 32, saw a big with signals of distress, flying; bore down to her, and found her to be the Hannak, of Whitehaven, in a sinking condition—took off her crew, together with the crew of the big Helena of Liverpool, 23 persons in all, 10 of whom were sick.

The Arabia sailed at 11 o'clock A. M. for Boston, where she will arrive at an early hour to-morrow (Monday) evening.

The interest this week centers more in negotiations than fighting, although the important announcement is received of a violation of Servian territory by the Russians at Radezep.

Austria appears to be acting more in union with the Western Powers, while Prussia leans more to Russia, although temporizing with both parties.

On the 9th of the protocol defining the integrity of the Ottoman Territory was signed at Vienna by the Four Powers, including Prussia, but simultaneously therewith Prussia introduced into her mutual alliance treaty with Austria, conditions and limitations which would render the treaty a dead letter.

The military arrangements arising out of the proposed treaty have been referred to a Commission presided over by the Prince of Prussia.

It was announced that Chevalier Bunsen, the Prussian minister at London, had been recalled, and no reason assigned, but the whole story was subsequently contradicted.

Hanover sides with the Western Powers. All the minor German States except Bavaria, do likewise, and will support Austria in forcing Prussia to declare herself, should the subject come before the Federal Diet.

Independent Belgians announce positively that a treaty of permanent Alliance, offensive and defensive, had just been signed between France and England, independently of the treaties of the present war.

The Turkish Government have ordered all Greeks who will not consent to place themselves under the exclusive protection of the Porte, to leave the Turkish Territory within fifteen days from March 30.

This expulsion, it is said, was determined on by the Port contrary to the advice of the Representatives of the Four Powers.

April 12.—Admiral Napier, left Kioje Bay for Gulland it being reported that some of the Russian ports were opened, and that a Russian Squadron was off Faroe.

Also reported three American ships somewhere in the Baltic, with stores for Russia, and an English steamer was despatched after them.

There was but little ice in the Gulf of Finland.

THE POSITION OF THE NEGRO PARTY.

If a vote were taken in the county on the question of repealing the Missouri Compromise, it would not be votes enough in favor of that measure to make it interesting.

And yet we foresee that quite a number will vote at the very next election, so as to promote this very repeal, and to hold the Power in its sphere of conquest and subjugation.

We hope our readers will endeavor to lay before their neighbors who desire to resist the extension of Slavery, the facts which go to show that a vote for Bigler will be a vote to repeal the Missouri Compromise.

For instance the administration papers admit that the citizens in New Hampshire and Connecticut, demanded that Bigler should resign.

Just so it will be in this State. If Bigler is elected by the usual majority the advocates of the Douglas fraud will claim that the people of the State have endorsed this iniquity, and so a vote for Bigler will be a vote for Slavery.

The papers in Pennsylvania which advocate the election of Bigler with three or four exceptions, advocate the passage of the Douglas bill.

The only exceptions to the rule so far as known are as follows: the Montreal Democrat, the Boston Reporter and Worcester Knave. One or the other are on the fence deliberating whether to serve the people or the administration.

But the great mass of papers that display the Bigler flag, also carry the black flag of slavery.

Now it is certain that three-fourths of the voters of this State have no sympathy with this iniquitous scheme to cheat freedom out of the boon conceded to her in consideration of the admission of a slave State.

We believe that a large majority will enter their protest against it at the polls; if the friends of freedom do their duty, the friends of slavery will be before the people for their consideration.

Reader, this list is a work in which you have something to do. If you desire the supremacy of the principles of freedom, let your acts be a living witness of the strength of that desire.

You have a neighbor who has paid no attention to this subject. Reason with him, and get him to take and read some paper that advocates the maintenance of lighted fires, and the overthrow of the Slave Power.—Civilians Journal.

THE SACREDNESS OF MARRIAGE.

The National Intelligencer of this morning contains the following local item:—The Criminal Court met yesterday morning pursuant to adjournment and several small cases were disposed of by submission.

On Saturday last a free colored man named George Gaines, was convicted of bigamy; but yesterday the Judge discharged Gaines on the ground that the prior marriage was void, on the parties having been a slave, and married without the consent of the owner.

This announcement is made in a leading and dignified American newspaper, published in the metropolis of the Republic. The fact is had enough as stated, but not as bad as the reality. With the consent of the owner the marriage would have been void.

The law does not recognize the marriage of slaves under any circumstances; and any man of color, or white man disposed to intermarry with women of color, may in the city of Washington have as many wives as Joe Smith or Brigham Young, provided they are all slaves.
