The Newfoundlanders are said to have suffered dreadfully the past winter from famine.

During the past month, four hundred and ten vessels arrived at New York from foreign ports.

The leading Irish Catholics in Britain have issued a protest against Protestant Government inspection of numeraries.

The editors of Illinois in a State Convention drafted a memorial to Congress against increasing the rates of newspaper and letter postage.

There are ten or twelve frightful cases of lip, tongue, and face cancer in the London cancer hospital, all resulting from excessive smoking.

Two Cataumans were shot in Dauphin County, Pa., recently. One of these ferocious animals measured five feet and a half in length, and three feet in height.

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The census shows a population of 112,000 in New Orleans, of whom about one-half were born in foreign countries. New York has contributed to the American population of the city about four-tenths as many as any other State except Louisiana.

A comprehensive scheme to throw 20,000 negroes from the free States into the territories of Nebraska and Kansas, has been matured at the Worcester Convention, and a Committee appointed to carry it into effect by raising funds to aid emigration.

Two negro children were lately consumed in a burning house in Jefferson county, Ala. The "Prairie Clarion" says—"They perished in the flames to the regret of the humane, and the loss of their master."

There are in the United States 2,363,000 farmers; 100,000 merchants; 40,000 physicians; 24,000 lawyers; 30,000 teachers; 27,000 clergymen; 70,000 insurers; 10,000 fishermen; and 10,000 State and federal officers.

The Rockland Gazette, in announcing the receipt of a new work speaks thus briefly and unimpassionedly: "We have received a book entitled 'Arabella, a Tale of Tenderness.' The author is a fool."

The latest style of fashionable parades in New York is described as a light grey ground with the castle of Heidelberg in dark blue, on one leg, and Mount Vesuvius vomiting forth fire on the other.

Few persons have any idea of the extent of Nebraska. Its boundary is three thousand miles in length; its area five hundred thousand square miles, and it will form twelve states, each as large as Ohio.

The Secretary of State of Pennsylvania, in accordance with the law lately passed, in view of proposals until the first Monday of July for the purchase of the Main Line of the Public Works. No bid will be received for less than \$10,000,000.

Admiral Nipper, who commands the British fleet in the Baltic, figured in the war against the United States in 1812, and is very creditable, as he was joined with Cochrane and Cockburn in making war upon the fort-houses and men-of-war of the Virginia farmer.

The editor of the Louisville Journal, while in Washington, in conversation with democrats, he found more opposition to, and condemnation of, the administration than among the Whigs, and was often in surprise at hearing such whole-some friends of the Administration.

The cigars consumed throughout the country in one year would make a worm six feet high round the District of Columbia, and the air expelled in smoking them would drive the Japans round the world, with enough over to do the work of all the planet smokers.

A large American boy measuring six feet eight inches from tip to toe, was shot into Suisse country, Va. He had for some time been making free with the flocks of Mr. Mason, and was finally overwhelmed just as he had pointed upon his eighteenth lamb.

W. C. Minge, an eminent lawyer of New Orleans, died April 16th, from a disease of the brain, brought on by intense mental application. It made its first appearance in the loss of memory, and then grew rapidly to total unconsciousness and bodily prostration, ending in death from exhaustion of the powers of nature.

Hon. Henry Dutton, the next in rank of Connecticut, delivered his messages to the Legislature on the 4th inst. It occupies five columns of the "Courant." The message argues strongly for the constitutionality of the Maine Law, but refers to the Legislature the question whether it is desirable as the voice of the people. It also takes strong ground against the Nebraska Bill.

Mr. Slidell's plan for the seizure of Oregon is condemned by the Richmond Examiner, a leading Democratic journal. That paper also expresses its desire that the President would change his cabinet. But it is too late for the present executive to redress himself.

The examiner believes that with a better cabinet could rally the Democracy to his support again. This will sound like an absurdity to all who are aware of the extraordinary deficiency in Gov. Pierce of high moral and mental qualities which can alone command for him the respect and confidence and respect of a free and intelligent people.

Walker, the filibuster, and his men have abandoned their ridiculous attempt to take possession of Lower California and Sonora, and have started overland by the Gila route, for Texas. At the time of his invasion the people of that part of Mexico were resting in profound peace, and he had no shadow of an excuse for his walkie-expedition which was as completely piratical and unfathomable as Pizarro's invasion of Peru.

The Washington, Pa., Commonwealth, has received a letter from the Hon. James Pollock, the Whig candidate for Governor, in which he states that the rumors of his contemplated withdrawal, are without the slightest foundation in fact—that he is prepared to meet the responsibilities of his position, and sustain the issue of the nominating convention.

The Cleveland (O.) Morning Leader of 5th inst., says that on the 2d, a young lady named Mary Zollars went into a drug store at Carrollton, and began playfully to examine the drugs by tasting and smelling. She at length touched some powdered strichnine to her tongue, and immediately spit it out. Nausea and dizziness came on in a few minutes, and in fifteen minutes she was a corpse.

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Mosquito territory has lain *perdu* three hundred and sixty-one years and seven months, or since the discovery of Columbus, but in these latter times just the same number of contestants have arisen for the honor and profit of possessing it, as fought for the distinction of Hong Kong's birthplace, to wit, the five Central American States, the United States and Great Britain. And it is now most of them conceded to be of no more value than a free negro, for they agree that it will be the owner of itself.
