The European Republican Leaders, if we may credit the Washington Star, are about to issue from London, a public manifesto, taking ground against political abolitionism in America, and declaring their original expressions of sympathy with the opponents of slavery were caused by their want of a proper knowledge of the politics of the United States.

The steamship Canada, has arrived at Halifax from Liverpool, bringing news from Europe a week later than previous advices. The steamer, which left the port of London on the 15th of June, had a most successful voyage, having 70,000 tons of cargo and making great initial sales. They had effected a practicable breach in the wall, but a sudden rise in the Danube, prevented the storming of the fortress. On the night of the 27th, the Russians lost 1,500 men killed in three attempts to storm. The Turkish garrison also made a sally, and killed and wounded 4,500 Russians. On the 31st, the Turks defeated 200,000 Russians at Sitaria, killing 500,000 men, and capturing 500 guns. Other successes, more or less bloody, are reported. The reported victory of the Greek insurgents in Thessaly is confirmed. In China the insurgents are reported to have captured Shanghai.
