Pennsylvania Election.

We have returns from 34 Cos, which give Pollock an aggregate majority of about 25,-000 as reported. The Tribune says Pollock is elected by a majority of at least 30,000, probably larger. Bradford Co. is reported to give Pollock 2000 majority : Tioga 800 to 1000; Luzerne 800; Philadelphia 4000. and almost all show a great gain over Johnstons vote. Bigler has 200 majority in Wayne. which gave him 1442 majority in 1851. Little Sullivan give him 175 majority.
