The battle of the Alma seems the theme of boundless exultation on the part of the English press.

At the Alma the Allies, with not less than 50,000 men, took the entrenched heights of the river, held and defended by 35,000 Russians, losing in the battle 600 killed and 2,300 wounded.

At the battle of Buena Vista general Taylor with 4,750 men, lost only 433 but never again was in action, but were actually under the discipline of the field, being absolutely regular, - and not put to utter rout.

At the battle of Contreras and Churubusco Gen. Scott with 5,820 men, stormed over 18,000 Mexicans strengthened and abundantly supplied with artillery.

At the battle of Chapultepec, in that affair 833 men, or one-third of his force, - pushed on towards the capital, dispersing all the bands that resisted his advance.
