A despatch from Tunkhannock to the Advertiser, under date of the 3d instant, gives the following account of an attempt to rob Bennett's bank at that place:

H. P. Van Brocklyn, on arriving at Tunkhannock last evening, returned on a train trip to Glen Orono, on train number twelve, due at this station about 11 o'clock, while passing the bank of F. C. Bennett & Co., discovered a light inside of the bank, which looked suspicious to them. They went to the residence of F. C. Bennett, which is situated close by the bank, and getting Mr. Bennett out by ringing the door bell, which the burglars heard and left before they could be caught. The money drawer was found partly open, which contained about twenty dollars in bank part of the drawer, which was not discovered by the burglars. The lock was entered by breaking in the back window and loosening a catch on the window. No clue to the burglars has been discovered nor any arrested.

A correspondent of the Troy Register, writing under date of the 29th of July, yet says: "Last night, Smithfield was again visited by burglars. The office in the back part of the store of W. E. Voorhis, was entered by breaking out a few lights of glass, tearing off the casing and taking out the cash. By some means they managed to close the door between the office and the store, shutting the large watch dog into the store, where they were at one in the office, where they found the safe, the object of their visit.
