A MICHIGAN CONVICT'S TRICK. In Trying to Destroy the Prison

About 10.30 o'clock Wednesday night the convicts in the third tier of cells in the east wing of the prison smelled fire, and as they raised an alarm shricks were heard issuing from cell No. 69, occupied by a life man named Isaac Van Auken. The guard on duty ascended to the cell as quickly as possible, which he found filled with smoke, while flames enveloped the grated entrance. Owing to the expansion of the iron door by the heat, difficulty was experienced in opening it, but when it swung back the wretch. who occupied the cell sprang naked through the flame. Meantime his cries of agony were terrible, for he was being literally cooked, and as he shot out upon the corridor he would have gone over the railing to he stone floor, many feet below, had the guard not caught him by the arm and staid his headlong spring. He was shockinglyburned about the face and all over his body, and as he was being taken to the hospital repeatedly cried: "I want to die! I have been a bad man; I deserve this!" THe ling-ered about twenty-four hours when death put an end to his sufferings.

The cell occupied by the desperate man i 8 feet 51 inches wide by 8 feet long and 61 feet high. It is arched overhead with brick, of which the walls are also composed, and is air-tight, without a fissure or opening of any kind anywhere save at the grated door. It resembles an oven, and on this occasion was converted into that sort of appurtenance by the occupant. It seems he had piled his bed clothes, the apparel he wore together with the canvass cot in which he mept, and a pine box in which he kept his letters, against the door of his cell, then pouring the oil of his lamp over the mass, as is conjectured, set it on fire. Van Auken came from Lenawce county

for life on the S0th of July, 1866. His crime was one of demoniacal brutality. In a paroxysm of rage he cut down his wife and killed her in cold blood with an axe; then pursuing his son, who ran into an adjoining field to escape him, also killed him with the gory implement, fresh with his mother's blood. He was a surly, mean, dogged scoundrel about the prison.—Jack

AN IMPORTANT NEW INDUSTRY. How the Cauning Business Has Sprang

One of the most prosperous and thriving of all the new industries of this country is the canning of fruits and vegetables. The igures given in a recent census bulletin show how fast this important industry has grown within the past decade. In 1870 there were 97 persons and firms engaged in the business; in 1880 the number had in creased to 551. The value of the products of these establishments has increased from \$5,400,000 in 1870 to \$17,600,000 in 1880 Every year shows a considerable increase in the number of articles to which the cauning process is made applicable. Nearly every sort of fruit, vegetable, ment and fish are now the subjects of the canning method of preservation. There is one improvement very much needed in connection, with this ndustry, and that is a can that will not be

affected by the acids contained in the fruit.
