COURT PROCLAMATION.
WHEREAS the Hon. Robert G. White,
President Judge, and the Hon. J. Dar-
ling and S. Holmes, Associate Judges of the
Courts of Oyer & Terminer and General Jail
Delivery, Quarter Sessions of the Peace, Or-
phans' Court and Court of Common Pleas for
the County of M'Kean have issued their precept,
bearing date Saturday, the 2d day of October,
in the year of our Lord one thousand eight
hundred and forty-eight, and to me directed, for
holding a Court of Oyer and Terminer and
General Jail Delivery, Quarter Sessions of the
Peace, Orphans' Court, and Court of Common
Pleas, in the Borough of Smethport, on Mon-
day, the twenty-seventh day of December next,
and to continue one week.

Notice is therefore hereby given to the Cor-
oners, Justices of the Peace, and Constables
within the county, that they be then and there
in their proper persons, at 10 o'clock A. M. of
said day, with their rolls, records, inquisitions,
examinations, and other remembrances, to do
those things which their offices appertain to be
done. And those who are bound by their re-
cognizances to prosecute the prisoners that are or
shall be in the jail of said county of M'Kean,
are to be then and there to prosecute the same
as will be just.
