

GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION
WHEREAS the Hon. Robert G. White, President Judge, and the Hon. J. Darling and S. Holmes, Associate Judges of the Courts of Oyer and Terminer, and General Jail Delivery, Quarter Sessions of the Peace, Orphans Court, and Court of Common Pleas for the County of M'Kean have issued their precept, bearing date Saturday, the 5th day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine, and to me directed, forth holding a Court of Oyer and Terminer and General Jail Delivery, Quarter Sessions of the Peace, Orphans Court, and Court of Common Pleas, in the Borough of Smethport, on Monday, the twenty-seventh day of June, next, and to continue one week.

Notice is therefore hereby given to the Coroners, Justices of the Peace, and Constables within the county, that they be then and there in their proper persons, at 10 o'clock A. M. of said day, with their rolls, records, inquisitions, examinations, and other remembrances, to do those things which their offices pertain to be done. And those who are bound by their recognizances to prosecute the prisoners that are or shall be in the jail of said county of M'Kean, are to be then and there to prosecute against them as will be just.
