Official notice is given that in all cases in which pre-emption declaratory statements founded on bona fide actual settlement and cultivation of public lands, are made prior and up to date, and filed by the settlers before the 10th of October, the registers and receivers are directed, where the pre-emption claimants are unable and do not appear up and in for their tract of or before that time, to withhold such tract of or until the 10th of October.
