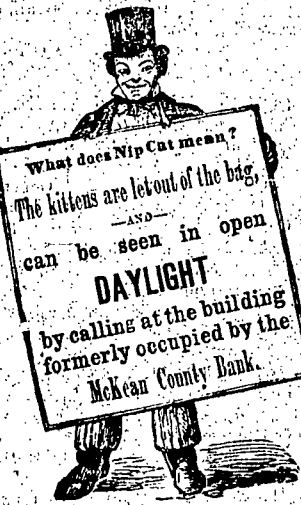

ELECTION PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS, in and by the 10th section of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, passed July 31 1850, entitled "An Act relating to the elections of the Commonwealth," it is enjoined on the Sheriff of every County to give notice of such elections to be held and enumerated in such notice what officers are to be elected. In pursuance thereof, I, JOSEPH MORSE, High Sheriff of the County of McKean, do hereby make known and give this public notice to the electors of said County of McKean, that a General Election will be held in the said County on the

Second Tuesday of October, next, being the 11th day of October, 1859, for the election of the following officers, to wit:— One person for Auditor General.

One person for Sheriff General.

One person to represent the counties of Tioga, Potter, McKean and Warren in the State Senate.

Two persons to represent the County of Clearfield, Elk, Jefferson and McKean, in the House of Representatives of Pennsylvania.

One person for County Commissioner.

Two persons for County Auditors.

One person for Coroner.

All the qualified electors of the County of McKean shall hold their elections in the several districts as follows:—

The Borough of Smethport, at the Court House in Smethport.

The Township of Bradford at the School House in Littleton.

The Township of Ceres at the House of E. J. Babber.

The Township of Corydon at the School House near J. Farmers.

The Township of Eldred at the Eldred Hotel.

The Township of Hamilton at the Aldrich School House.

The Township of Hamilton at the School House near Ish Morrison.

The Township of Keating at the Court House in Smethport.

The Township of Liberty at the School House in Port Allegany.

The Township of Lafayette at the School House near Luther Davis.

The Township of Norwich at the House of C. R. Burdick.

The Township of Otto at the School House in Pennsylvania.

The Township of Shippen at the House of N. L. Dyke.

The Township of Sisson at the House of Joseph Lucas.

The Township of Wetmore at the House of Wm. Zebby. And I also give notice that every person excepting the Justices of the Peace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the Government of the United States, or of the State, or of any city or incorporated district whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, subordinate officer or agent, who is or shall be employed under the Legislative, Executive or Judiciary department of the State, or of the United States, or of any incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress, or of the State Legislature, or of the Select or Common Council of any City or Commissioner of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of exercising at the same time the office of Judge, Inspector, or Clerk of an election in this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector, Judge or other officer of any such election, shall be eligible to any office that is to be voted for. And, in and by the 4th section of an Act approved the 16th day of April 1840, it is enacted that the 18th section of an Act passed July 31, 1850, entitled "An Act relating to the elections in this Commonwealth," shall not be construed so as to prevent any military or borough officer, from serving as Judge, Inspector or Clerk at any general or special election of this Commonwealth.

And the Return Judges at the respective Districts aforesaid are required to meet at Smethport, the County seat of said County, on Friday the 10th of October, or the 11th day of October next, then and there to discharge the duties devolving upon them under and in pursuance of the Act of September, A. D. 1850, and of the Independence of the United States the 4th day of July.
