

THE STARS AND STRIPES.—Washington seems to have been the inventor of the thirteen stripes, signifying the union of thirteen colonies. This flag was raised in January, 1776, and was confirmed by Congress in 1797, with the addition of thirteen stars on a blue field. On the 24th of April, 1812, it was enacted by Congress that the United States flag should consist of thirteen stripes, alternately white and red, with twenty stars, white on blue field and that one star should be added for every new State, the addition to be made on the 4th of July following the admission of each State.

U. S. TROOPS AT THE SOUTH.—It is stated that at the special request of a number of prominent citizens of Georgia, the United States Arsenal at Augusta, in that State, has been placed in the possession of federal troops; and the signal at Fayetteville, N. C., is to be occupied by a company of the second cavalry, at the request of citizens of that place. This movement is intended as a measure of precaution in view of any possible trouble which may arise from the Presidential election.—*Petersburgh Express.*

HENDERSON, Ky., Nov. 12
A large and enthusiastic meeting, irrespective of party, was held here to-day, by Governor Dixon presiding. Strong Union speeches were made by Bell, Breckinridge, and Douglas men. Union resolutions were adopted, and secession was strongly deprecated. A meeting of the people of the whole county is called for Saturday next, at Louisville.

The total amount of earnings of the Western Division of the Sunbury and Erie Road, from Sept. 1 to Nov. 1, 1860, was \$17,208.90. The heaviest week's earnings was that ending Nov. 1, \$3,581.22. Taking these two months as a criterion, we find the 66 miles finished of the Western Division will earn \$103,613.94 per annum.
