Paucity.—Our friend L. W. Grevord, has been promoted to the Captaincy of the Cameron Rifles, in place of John Eckman, whose health failed. Capt. Gifford is an efficient officer, and his promotion is deserving.

Latest News.—With the exception of a few outside skirmishes near Bailey's cross roads, every thing is quiet about Washington. The report of the death of Jefferson Davis appears to be unfounded.

Official dispatches were received at the War Department on the 4th inst., from Gen. Rosecrans, stating that his army was all safe and well, and that the rumors of their being surrounded are likely to be all untrue.

From Frankfort it is learned that the Kentucky Legislature has in session, will go on to the 15th inst., and that Gov. McGuffin has previously notified certain members of his intention to sustain the action of the Legislature, whatever it may be. If this be true Kentucky might be considered safe.

It is learned by way of Richmond that the privateer J. M. Davis had been wrecked on the beach of St. Augustine, Florida, and that the crew had arrived at Fernandina, and were received with great hospitality by the citizens.

A large and enthusiastic public meeting, was held at Irving Hall, New York, on the 4th inst., for the purpose of bearing an address from ex-Secretary Holt.

On Monday, the 26th ult., an expedition consisting of seven war steamers besides a number of tug and transport steamers, having on board a land force, left Hampton Roads, under command of Brig. Gen. Butler. The fleet was in command of Flag officer Stringham. The expedition proceeded to Hatteras Inlet, N. C., where the vessels had erected two forts, which were taken after a cannonade of two days. Seventy-five cannon, 1,000 stand of arms, and 710 prisoners were taken, among whom were General Barlow, Lieut. Sharp, Dr. Wyatt, and M. Brown, all late of the U. S. Navy, and Mj. Andrews, and other officers, late of the U. S. Army. This is considered an important point, and was taken without any loss on our part. The amount of loss on their side is not known. The surrender was unconditional.

"Swallow."—The editor of the Elk Advocate, it will be recollected, promised to make an attempt, two weeks from night, to "swallow" the "old and brittle," the resolutions passed at the St. Mary's convention. We were prepared from common report strengthened by actual observation during a brief acquaintance, to witness no mean performance in that line; but must confess to being disappointed at the result. He not only opens his countenance on the resolutions, but attempts to engulf in his capacious stomach the whole concern—resolutions, delegates, candidates and all he does not even spare the Democrat. If he could accomplish all this by a fast of two weeks, what might not be expected with a reasonable time for preparation; J. M. Davis said his seceders might be quietly put where a "dog wouldn't bite." Of course we are "down in the mouth."

The gentleman in his last issue says we "gitched into him in a mean and ungentlemanly manner," and thereupon devotes a part of the two pages his sheet contains to our castigation, and to misrepresenting the doings of the convention and the resolutions. The tone of the article is what might have been expected from one whose habits and associations make him familiar with pot-house literature, giving evidence of the wandering incoherency of brain sure to result from such habits. One insinuation will show the depth of baseness to which even editors may descend—that the resolutions were tampered with after being given him for publication; when it is understood that he attended the convention for the avowed purpose of obtaining a report of the proceedings for publication, saying that his paper had been delayed for that purpose, it certainly should make even him blush to endeavor to create the impression that they were changed after coming to his hands. No one should know better than himself—for he was present—that the resolutions were passed unanimously, and that both candidates approved the sentiments they contained, and he will learn, ere long that they pass the sentiments of the great mass of the people.

We are asked our plan of effecting a compromise. We would have the whole question left to the people, where it rightfully belongs; and in making preparations for defence, we would have a convention of the States called. It might have been in session before this; it should have been so longer. When the convention met, if its labors could not result in the restoration of the seceding States, it might

at least alter the constitution as to provide for coercion.
The cry of maintaining the Union comes with bad grace from men of the writer's class, who have for years been laboring to destroy it. They may indeed succeed in making the separation a final one, but their policy will never unite it.

Offer of Union.—It will be seen by the proceedings of the Republican convention which met at Smithport on Monday last, that an offer to unite on one ticket was made to the Chairman of the Democratic County Committee, who very properly refers it to the party at large. While we are willing to unite with all who have really at heart the maintenance of the constitution and laws, and the restoration of the Union, we cannot unite with a party whose success we feared would contribute to ruin our country, and whose continuance in power we conscientiously believe to be the greatest obstacle to our peace and prosperity. By such an union the Democracy would stultify themselves. We wish to see the party preserve its organization intact, never doubting that the honest masses will rally with it and once more place the destinies of the nation in hands where they will be as they have been heretofore, safe. If the people of McKean county have not had enough of Republican rule, let them by their votes continue the party in power. We wish to see the experiment thoroughly tested to the entire satisfaction of all. Let the Democracy bring forward for office men of ability who have the confidence of the people and we have no fear of the result.

McKean County Republican Convention.

Delegates met at the Court House in Smithport, on Monday, September 2d, 1861, and organized by appointing Hon. J. DARLING, Chairman, C. D. WEBSTER, Secretary.

Delegates from the different townships then presented their credentials, with the exception of Wetmore and Hamilton.

On motion, the delegates from Shippen were admitted and presented their credentials inasmuch as they have to vote with us for Representative.

On motion, Resolved, that a Committee of three be appointed to wait upon the Democratic Committee, and invite them to meet in Convention, for the purpose of enabling the two Conventions to unite in nominating a Union Ticket, pledged to a vigorous prosecution of the war until the Stars and Stripes and Federal laws shall be honored in all sections of the country.

On motion, Resolved, that we are in favor of a vigorous support of the war—not for the purpose of subjugating any people or State—not for the purpose of altering or crushing any institutions belonging to the people of our sister States—but for the purpose of maintaining the Constitution and Government of these United States in their purity as handed down to us by our fathers.

On motion, the Chair appointed S. HOLMES, W. J. COLKOVIC, and D. C. HOWARD, Committee under the first resolution to report, at the calling of the evening session.

On motion, adjourned till 7 p. m.

Evening Session.
Called to order by Chairman. Committee to confer with Democratic County Committee submit the following:

SMITHPORT, Sept. 2, 1861.
To His Honor J. DARLING, Pres't of the Convention now sitting at this place:
SIR:—I have been furnished, as Chairman of the Democratic County Committee, with a copy of Resolutions adopted by your body, proposing to unite on a common platform, without respect to party, in making the county nominations of candidates to be presented at the coming election. In the absence of all the other members of the County Central Committee, I do not feel warranted in making an answer accepting or rejecting the proposition; but if your Convention see proper to adjourn until two weeks from to-day, the 16th of Sept. inst., the time fixed for the meeting of the Democratic Convention, I will see that the Resolutions and the whole subject is laid before the people at the primary meetings in the several townships, when and where the subject may receive the consideration it deserves, and the delegates may receive instructions either for or against.

On motion, the proceedings of this meeting were ordered to be published.

WHEREAS, in and by the 13th section of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, passed July 2d 1860 entitled "An Act relating to the elections of the Commonwealth," it is enjoined on the Sheriff of every County to give notice of such election to be held and enumerated in such notices what officers are to be elected, in pursuance thereof, I, JAMES E.
