

**Election Proclamation.**

WHEREAS, in and by the 13th section of the Act of the General Assembly of Pennsylvania, passed July 3d, 1860, entitled "An Act relating to the Elections of the County of York," it is enjoined on the Sheriff of every County to give notice of such election to be held and conducted in such manner that officers are to be elected. In pursuance thereof, I, JAMES E. BLAIR, Sheriff of the County of York, do hereby make known and give this public notice to the electors of said county of York, that a general election will be held in the said County on the 21st day of October, next, being the 8th day of October, 1861, for the election of the following officers, to-wit:

One person for President, Judge to serve in the Judicial District, composed of the counties of York, Potter, Mifflin, Berks and Cameron.

Two persons to represent the counties of York, Kean, Elk, Jefferson and Clearfield, in the House of Representatives of Pennsylvania.

One person for Commissioner.

One person for Auditor.

One person for Coroner.

One person for District Attorney.

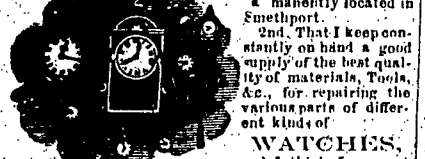
