A DISABLED SOLDIER SPEAKS FOR McCLELLAN. PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 14, 1864.

Messrs. Editors.—I was much pleased to-day to see in your paper a letter from a veteran of the Twenty-third Regiment Pennsylvania vols.

On Saturday morning, 20th, at 7 o'clock, we started once more for a place called "Lake City" thirty-three miles distant.

We returned to Jacksonville, fifty-eight miles distant, and reached there last night at 12 o'clock.

The enemy had fifteen thousand men opposed to us, and of course whipped us badly.
