## HORATIO SEYMOUR.

The editor being unable to get to the office in season for lack of reading matter.

Judge McClellan and James K. Kerr, Esq., delegates to the late State Convention, are from the Northern Congressional District. Both gentlemen have served in the present war.

What our best friends think of us is strikingly illustrated by the following from Washington:

At a recent diplomatic dinner the Russian Minister said to me with remark that the United States was rapidly tending to a despotism, while Russia is daily becoming republicanized.

There is a political revolution in this State. She has sent a Democratic to the town elections by fifty thousand majority.

A warning starting report—A "liable" gentleman who saw the man that told it to him, has given to the Washington correspondent of the St. Louis Union the following trustworthy anecdote about General McClellan:—It has not yet appeared in the Tribune, but will in due course—the large number of stories of the same kind which that honest paper has on hand having unavoidably prevented its publication.

It has been ascertained here that General McClellan, after he was superseded by General Burnside, went down to Richmond in a balloon and had a long interview with Jeff. Davis; that the result of this interview was that McClellan, in disguise as the rebel commander, fought and repulsed Burnside at Fredericksburg and Hooker at Chancellorsville. Horace Greeley's partiality for McClellan has induced him to be silent till now.

TO TEACHERS AND PUPILS.—In order to address the columns of the M'Kean County Democrat in behalf of the United States Sanitary Commission. A fair for this humane organization will be held in Philadelphia early in June and the schools in the several counties of this State are called upon to send contributions. There is to be a Department exclusively for the schools and when the roll of the counties of our State shall be called, it must not be that M'Kean County shall make no response. Men have gone forth to give years of toil and hardship and even life itself for us; and now we are asked to give some trifles which may alleviate, in some degree their condition. Perhaps I can not serve the cause better than by submitting the following communication:

PHILADELPHIA, March 1st 1864. S. E. GORNER Sixth and Walnut Streets. To C. CORNFORTH: The Executive Committee of the Great Central Fair, in aid of the United States Sanitary Commission, has empowered me to appoint such Committee as I may deem judicious, in order to enlist the active co-operation of all pupils in the Private Schools of the State of Pennsylvania, in the collection or preparation of articles for sale, or for Soldiers' or Seamen's use, to be exhibited or disposed of at the Great Central Fair, to be held early in June next, in this City. Pursuant to the duty thus devolved upon me, I have appointed you one of that Committee to represent your county in the Public-School Department. If you see fit to extend your exertions beyond this special appointment, the greater will be the good produced.

Allow me, earnestly, to entreat that you present this subject to the attention of all pupils in anywise within the scope of your jurisdiction or influence, bearing in mind, that the cause in hand is to aid those brave men who have left their homes and families and gone forth to venture the perils and privations of a soldier's life, that we might be protected in our properties and lives, and that our National existence might be preserved.

You are empowered to take such measures within your county as you may think best calculated to secure activity of pupils in the cause reporting to me, from time to time, your success—and here let me suggest that, if the head of each school, was specially designated by you as one of your Committee, to have the immediate supervision of the same, it would contribute largely to success. Whenever a box or package is ready, let it be forwarded according to the directions herein given.

Please cause the circular on this sheet, to be read in all your schools, and to do me the favor to acknowledge the receipt of this letter.

In forwarding contributions, please to observe the following directions: 1st. Mark each box, package or bundle clearly this: To EDWARD SHIPPEN, Chairman of School Committee, Great Central Fair Warehouse, Philadelphia.

2d. On one corner mark your name and county.

3d. Send by Express or railroad Company, or private hand, but do not prepay charges.

4. Mail to me the Bill of Lading or receipt from the Express or Railroad Company, and also a list of articles, together with the donor's name.

5. Let all contributions be forwarded, so as to be delivered at the Warehouse in Philadelphia, before the fifteenth day of May—the earlier the better.

6. Let each article be labelled or marked with its reasonable value.

7. Let every box, parcel or package be well and securely put up, and the contents carefully packed.

# REVIEW OF THE WEEK

Our war-news the present week is, in comparison with past weekly reports since the opening of the war, of no great importance. A few skirmishes, "movements," and rumors of "movements," comprise the whole. To be sure, death and wounds are the inevitable concomitants of each "affair," but were not important in its military results, but the people have become so well accustomed to the destruction of life and the mutilation of humanity through the medium of war, that they care little or nothing, unless individually injured, for small things, unless a great battle, with long lists of killed and wounded, is the only thing which can excite their deepest attention. Happy we are unable to furnish a sensation of that sort.

About ten thousand effective troops have been added to General Thayer's command on route for Texas, and the whole number under General Steele, moving in another direction in Arkansas is from 30,000 to 35,000.

Our New Orleans correspondent states that the Rio Grande is being evacuated by the national troops, and that a general concentration of forces is being made in General Bank's department.

General Grant occupied his time at Fortress Monroe on Friday in visiting the fortifications and reviewing some of the troops.

A bill will be reported in a few days consolidating all the artillery regiments in the army into corps, to be commanded by a major-general.

It is supposed that General W. F. Smith will supersede Butler at Fortress Monroe.

It is announced that General Buell is to command the Army of the Ohio. General S. Negley, M. Cook, Crittenden, Newton, and Sykes have been ordered to report to General Sherman.

It is said that Johnson is reinforcing Lee.

In accordance with Judge Advocate Hall's opinion in the premises, wherein he advises that the President should retain the power to summarily dismiss officers of the army and navy, the Senate Military Committee have reported adversely to the bill, taking from the President such power.

The business portion of New Liberty, Owen County, Kentucky, was destroyed by fire on Sunday.

Pullard's "Southern History of the War," and all other books based on southern information have been seized by the provost-marshal of St. Louis.

The Rhode Island Democratic State Central Committee have made their nominations for state officers, selecting George H. Browne, of Gloucester, for governor.

An effort is being made to procure the postponement of the June Republican convention until August or September. It is thought that such a course will diminish the chances of Mr. Lincoln's nomination.

French war steamers are daily expected at the mouth of the Rio Grande for the purpose of an attack upon Matamoros. Cortinas preclaims his intention of taking the field against the invaders. The people are transferring their cotton in foreign ships, in order to save it from the French.

CONNECTICUT ELECTIONS.—As was fully expected, the election in Connecticut has gone against the Democrats—a result which has hardly been doubted, since the result of the New Hampshire election has been known.

The Democrats of Connecticut, however, have made a noble fight against the enormous advantages their opponents acquired by the unscrupulous use of government power and patronage.

Count Johnnie, the patriot philosopher, and prophet predicted, in a speech before the Legislature, that if Secretary Seward did not humbly apologize to the French Emperor for the resolution passed in the House last Monday, in ninety days the leading powers of the old world would recognize the southern confederacy. Let Secretary Seward hear and heed. Children and fools sometimes say things that even wise men would do well to think over.

The force of an election was gone through with in Maryland yesterday. Baltimore, as pro-severity a city as Richmond, voted only for Seward, until an immense crowd had assembled, thronging the streets and blocking on the avenues in the vicinity. The Town Hall stands on the corner of the above streets, and when the hand struck up "Hail to the Chief," and had finished it, there went up three deafening cheers for McClellan. Then it was that a voice from the crowd was heard: "Let us form a McClellan Club, here and now." "That is the talk," "We'll all go in," "Little Mac's our man!" "Hip, hip!"—and out burst from hundreds of throats another rousing cheer for "the man that we love." At this moment the doors of the old hall swung open, the gas suddenly flashed out as by magic, and in a moment the great hall was crowded to its utmost capacity. The meeting was organized by the choice of a temporary chairman and secretary. A committee of two from each ward was appointed to report a meeting on Thursday next period of officers of the "McClellan Club" of Ithaca; also, a committee was made to report a constitution and resolutions.

From this spontaneous gathering you will hear of one of the largest and most efficient working organizations springing that will be started in the western part of the state to aid a good cause. The meeting was addressed by several gentlemen with spirit and great effect, and the meeting in fact was sung with applause by Renny, the celebrated. Unconditional.

THE late Riot Case in Pike Township.—A Pardon—Abolitionists above the Law—Democrats Forewarned.

Your readers are generally aware that three young men of Curwensville, or Pike township, were tried and convicted of a charge of Riot at the January term of the Quarter Sessions of this county, and that their sentence was postponed until the March Term. They will also remember that we declined to say anything about the merits of the case, for the reason that legal proceedings had not yet terminated.

The history of the case is about this: The Democrats held a meeting at Curwensville on the afternoon previous to the last October election. In the evening of that day a fight took place between George A. Bloom and an Alderman—a returned soldier who had been wounded at Gettysburg. No evidence relating to his affair was permitted to be given on the trial, but we presume to state the fact. It has not been charged that this affair was sought by Bloom.

Bloom, with his wife, left his home—five miles distant—about 9 o'clock, and immediately after putting away his horses, retired to bed. Sometime afterward he was aroused from his slumbers by a demand for admittance. This was refused, when the windows and doors were immediately assailed with stones, clubs, &c., accompanied with the discharge of fire-arms; to the imminent danger of the inmates. The children, it is alleged, having been severely injured by a blow from a stone. Mr. Bloom, in his flight raised a back or garden window, and escaped to the help. This alarmed the neighbors, whose approach the rioters fled, leaving a bag of leathers and a can of tar, to testify as to the real purpose of their nocturnal visit.

Hartsborn, Pyles and Baird were arrested, bound over, and ultimately tried and convicted as above stated. Every latitude was given the defendants on the trial. No effort was made to withhold from the most trifling of their rights—and the jury was composed of men of both political parties; and as all men ought to know that for the purpose of preventing partiality in the verdict of the Jury, an man has just as much weight as eleven, all charges against the jury in this case falls to the ground.
