WASHINGTON NEWS.

Correspondence of the New-York Tribune.

THURSDAY, Dec. 30, 1841.

In the SENATE, the President presented a communication from the Secretary of State in answer to a Resolution of the 27th instant, stating that no proposition has been made between the Governments of the United States and Great Britain, with relation to their mutual Right of Search, since 4th of March, 1840.

Mr. ALLEN presented resolutions of the Legislature of Ohio instructing their Senators and requesting their Representatives to exert themselves for the immediate apportionment of Representatives according to the last census.

On motion of Mr. BARROW a resolution was adopted instructing the Committee on Commerce to inquire into the necessity an appropriation for the construction of a new Custom House at New Orleans.

The plan for the "Board of Exchequer" was again taken up, the question being on the motion of Mr. TALLMADGE to refer to a Select Committee of nine.

Mr. MANGUM spoke more than an hour, in decided and entire opposition to the scheme, which he said was repugnant to all hands, an unblushing push for, absolute power, such as had never been known in the history of the Government, proposing to superadd to the already overgrown patronage of the Government, the money power of the Country; it would break down the banks, already rotten, would produce distress and misery, and overshadowing all, the country could then lay down in that tranquility and repose which the writer of the plan desired—in the mean and mercenary despotism. He preferred the Sub-Treasury in any form to this monstrous system, which was nothing but the "Fiscal Corporation" put out in the rain, and exposed until struck down by the thunders of the Veto, it was now resuscitated, and placed under the shed of the Treasury Department. A plan so corrupting in its tendency and so grasping at absolute power, so ultra a measure, he had not expected from a Virginia-strict constructionist.

Without taking the question, the Senate went into Executive Session.

In the HOUSE, the SPEAKER presented a statement that had been laid on his table, that 30,000 copies of the Compendium of the Census, instead of 20,000 as ordered, and at a cost of \$60,000 above that anticipated, were now in the progress of printing, and would be completed unless stopped by the House. The statement was referred to the Select Committee on the Census.

The Tariff Question was again taken up, and Mr. MERIWETHER concluded his remarks in favor of the unconstitutionality of protection, and in reply to Mr. WELLER and other gentlemen, repelling the charges of increased expenditures made against the Whigs, and showing the items of a national debt of twenty-five millions dollars entailed on the present by Van Buren's Administration.

Mr. WINTHROP in his usual talented manner, advocated the doctrine of protection, showing its intimate connection with all the interests of the country. He contended that the Compromise Act, which was soon to expire, was defective and impracticable in many particulars; that it did not impose sufficient duties for the

just and economical wants of Government, and that the subject should be thoroughly investigated, not only with reference to the manufacturing, but the agricultural and commercial interests, and that which the aggregate amount of duties was to be laid for revenue, yet when this amount was once ascertained discrimination might be made in favor of all these interests.

The people of this country had looked forward to this tenth and last year of the Compromise Act, to have the subject thoroughly investigated, and themselves fairly and fully heard, and that through a committee favorable to their interests. In an effort now made by opponents of Protection to preclude such a hearing, an excitement would be created far greater than had existed on the subject of the 21st rule. The Tariff question should be candidly considered and settled this Session.

Both Houses adjourned over to Monday.

Extensive Circulation.

A curious instance of the circulation of a bank note is mentioned by the Houston Telegraph. A gentleman who was closing up some business of a mercantile firm in one of the western settlements of Texas, a few weeks since paid out a \$100 note on one of the Louisiana banks, and in a few days afterwards received it again from a person who was owing him. On making inquiry he ascertained that this bill had made the complete tour of the settlement, "paying up old scores," and had actually passed through the hands of twenty-four different debtors and creditors, thus paying debts to the amount of \$2,400—This incident will serve to show how small a sum of money is requisite to supply all the necessaries of domestic circulation.
