#### From the Baltimore American. The Iron Manufacture.

Appended to the Report of the Committee on Manufactures are some interesting state-Superintendent of the Mount Savage Iron Vorks, near Cumberland in this State, gives some valuable information concerning the manfacture of American Iron.

Mr. Young states that in answer to an interregatory from the Committee, that a duty of 50 er cent. ad valorem would be altogether inadestate to sustain the iron masters of the country. with a reasonable behief that our legislators would modify the Compromise Act and give a suitable protection, those engaged in the iron Lianufacture, whose means enable them to do so, have prepared to continue their works in operation this year and work up their stock of Laterials. Mr. Young says: "If the Compromise Act goes into effect in June, our markets will be glutted in July with the present surplus stocks in England. Their works now iving idle (one fourth of the whole) will be put in operation again, and prices will be kept low until our works are abandoned, after which they will be advanced ad libitum. When arrived at a point at which we could make iron at a moderate profit, should any be foolish enough to invest capital again in the manufacture, our kind friends in England will send it sufficiently cheap in ruin them, and thus control our whole sup-... ies at their sovereign will and pleasure. The low wages of the laborers in England, and the immense capital invested in large iron establishments, enable the manufacturers, in that country to produce iron at lower rates than is practicable in the United States at present, while the manufacture is yet in its infancy. But there is no doubt of the final and speedy success of the business here, if sufficient protection is extended to warrant investments in it. Mr. Young declares that if a reasonable protection is given by the Government, we shall within ten years send bar iron to England. For many purposes American bar iron is of superior excellence; and the country possesses ores of a fine quality in the most profuse abundance, with resources of coal both anthracite and bituminous, which are inexhaustible. It is essential to the defence and security of the country, as well as to its independence, that the iron manufacture should be encouraged and sustained at home. In the event of a war the right arm of our strength would be paralysed if we were dependent on foreign nations for supplies of this indispensable material. This consideration is so pressing that if there were no other reasons to be urged to the same point, in would alone be sufficient to justify the Government in affording any amount of protection that might be necessary for establishing our domestic iron interests upon a permanent basis. We shall conclude our temarks and references on the subject of Mr. Young's communication by quoting the following account of an important establishment now growing up in our State-merely adding that this gentleman, whose statements we have referred to with confidence as to their accuracy, has been an iron manufacturer, since 1817--that he was for fourteen years Superintendent of the West Point Foundry, and afterwards President of the Ulster Iron Company of New York--situations in which he has acquired all that practical knowledge of his business which personal experience for so long a time must give to an intelligent man: This communication is already too long, but I beg leave to introduce to your notice an esablishment just springing into existence, with which I am connected, viz: the works of the Maryland and New York Iron and Coal Company; situated at the foot of Savage mountain, 9 miles from Cumberland, on the route of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad. On the property of this company there is every material to make the best quality of bar iron, and in quantity sufficient to supply such an establishment as Sir John Guest's for one hundred and fifty years. There is sandstone peculiarly adapted

November last, and is now producing at the rate of 85 tons of ptg iron per week, of an excellent quality. They are now erecting a rolling mill

of sufficient extent to manufacture weekly 150 ments relative to the various important domestic tons of bar iron, including boiler plate, sheet, interests. A communication from Mr. Young, hoop, band, and railroad iron .- The Baltimore and Ohio railroad will be finished to Cumberland, and probably to the Company's works, in September or October next, by which time, should circumstances permit, the company will put their second blast furnace in operation, and go on to build two more.
