

DISAPPEARANCE OF FIXED STARS.—More than thirteen stars have disappeared within the last two years. One of these presented such a brilliant appearance for about sixteen months as to be visible to the naked eye at mid-day. La Place supposed it was burning up as it has never been seen since.

Review of the Markets.

FLOUR.—Sales were made early in the week of 500 bbls. choice brands for city use, in small lots, at \$1.12; and a further sale of 800 bbls. for shipping at \$4, with some odds and ends thrown in. Still later sales of 1700 bbls. at \$1. Rye Flour—Sales of small lots at \$2.87. Corn Meal, sales of 450 barrels Penna. at \$2.25; Brandywine \$2.50.

GRAIN.—But few transactions have taken place, the stock on hand being very light. Sales of Wheat at prices ranging from 85 to 90 cts. Rye—Sales of 1500 bush. Western at 55 cts.

PROVISIONS.—There is a steady retail demand at the following prices—Mess Pork \$7.50 a \$8; Prime \$5.75 a \$6.25; Mess Beef No. 1, \$7 a \$9; Prime \$6.25 a \$7.50; Lard, Western 7 a 7 3/4 cents per lb; Hams, Western 6 a 8 1-2 cents per lb; city 8 a 10 cents; Beef Tongues 40 a 45 cents. Potatoes—Mer- cer Potatoes are selling in vessels at 35 cents.

CATTLE MARKET.—672 Beeves offered; sales from 4 to 5 cents per lb; extra 5 1-4 - 36 Virginia cattle were sold for the New York market—37 remain unsold. 217 Cows and Calves, sales from \$16 to 23; extra, \$30 a \$34; Springers, \$12 a \$17; Dry Cows, \$4 a \$5. Hogs, 493 in market, 333 Western, principally from Ohio; sales from 3 3-4 to 4 1-4 cents per lb.—69 left over. 870 Sheep, sales from 57 cents to \$1.25; extra \$2.12.—Sat. Cour.

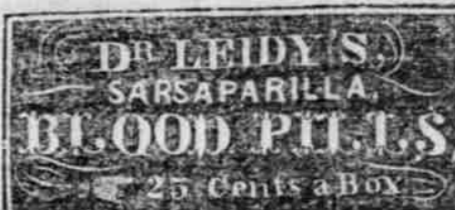
