"It is confidently expected here, that our Minister will demand his passports on the 1st of April, for it is reported that the instalment due on that day will not be paid. There is a man-of-war now lying ready to convey him home, and in case he is compelled to do so, trouble may be expected, for the American flag is daily subjected to insult. I went down to the wharf yesterday and my boat was ashore. In it was a Mexican officer, using our flag as a cushion, and he assuming an air of importance. I immediately went on board and pulled it from under him.—He drew his sword upon me and I knocked him overboard. I was soon surrounded by several soldiers, who held a court martial; but I was cleared by their own laws."

Outrage on American Sailors.

The following is given in the New Bedford Bulletin as an extract from a letter to the owner of the Agate by W. L. Baker, dated Ponce, March 29.
 "On or about the 20th inst., two of the Agate's crew, deserted from her, taking with them the best boat. I have made enquiries in order to recover the boat, but without effect; the Consul, however, informs me he shall inform our Government of the matter, and hopes thereby to get it, as also to recover the liberty of the men who have been taken and put on board a Spanish man-of-war, for the purpose I have no doubt, of retaining them, as they were short of men. Their names are James Allen and Jesse Merritt."

American Works in England.

We learn from the New York Commercial, that by the packet of March 4th, the Messrs Harper sent to John Murray, the great London publisher, 1250 copies of Stephens' Incidents of Travel in Yucatan. By the Britannia, they received an order for 950 copies more, which were shipped on Thursday last; and in addition to all these, Messrs. Wiley & Putnam have sent 250 copies to their house in London,—making in all 2250 copies. Of the Incidents of Travel in Central America, London has taken nearly 4000 copies.

COTTON.—There is decidedly a better feeling in the cotton market, and liberal sales of Tennessee at 6 cts. and Georgia Uplands from 6 7-8 to 7 1-8, have transpired.

FISH.—Liberal sales have been effected during the week, at the following prices: Salmon, Pickled, No. 1, \$14 a \$15; do. No. 2, \$12 a \$12.50; Mackerel, No. 1, \$8.25 a \$8.20; do. No. 2, \$5.75 a \$6.25; do. No. 3, \$3.87 1-2 a \$4.50; Grand Bank Codfish, \$2.37 1-2 a \$2.50 per 100 lbs. Cod Sounds and Tongues, in kits, \$1.25 a 1.50, as in size; Digby Herring, 70 cts per box; Salmon, in kits, 1.62 1-2 cts. a 2 dol. per kit, as in size. Smoked Salmon, 16 cts per lb.
