To all Interested.

It is a long time since we last urged upon our patrons the payment of their arrearages for subscription, &c. to the "Jeffersonian Republican." We were always averse to dunning, and therefore desisted, in the hope that a conviction of the "printers wants," would force itself upon their minds, and induce them to come forward and settle their accounts. But no such happy fortune has been ours! We have waited, until we can wait no longer; yet still we are without money! It is therefore imposible for us to hold off, or give any more time. We must have money, or something else; and our patrons must exert themselves to furnish it.

During the past year, our receipts have been very small; very few of out patrons having paid us any thing. A number, too, are still in arrears for two years; and some have paid nothing since the time we began to conduct the paper, which is nearly three years. Now, it must he obvious to every one, that it is impossible for us to get along in this way. Our patrons must pay up, once in a while, or we will be obliged to cease operations. We cannot live without receiving the wages of our labour.

In order to accommodate such as cannot make it convenient to pay in cash, we are ready and willing to receive any kind of good grain in liquidation of subscription, advertising, job printing, &c. We will also take County Checks, at a small discount. These offers are certainly fair, and we hope will be readily embraced by those who are in arrears to us. We must pay what we owe, and receive what is due and coming to us; -therefore, unless those who are indebted to us, come forward and settle before the close of the present volume, we will be obliged to enforce upon them the terms of our subscription, which is "two dollars and fifty cents, per annum, for all who do not pay before the end of the year."

The Senate is now full. It consists of 29 Whigs and 23 Loco Focos. In 1845 the terms of 13 Whig and 4 Loco Foco Senators will ex-To secure a majority when Mr. Clay comes in as President in 1845, it will be seen, says the Tribune, that the Whigs must carry a majority in the Legislature of 10 States, which will give them 25 Senators, (including those who hold over,) and leave party questions to be settled by the casting vote of the Vice President. The Loco Focos have already gained Am two states from us, viz: Mississippi and Michigan, and will confidentially expect to carry New York by their present large majority in the State Senate, which will probably control the joint ballot in the legislature, unless we Sto carry the City next fall as we must. On the Jer other hand, the Whigs have chances to gain Senators in Maine, Ohio and Pennsylvania. We urge upon our friends in all of the states where U. S. Senators are to be elected this year and next, to strain every nerve to carry their legislatures.
