Fourier, and the eroneous impression that association is impracneable, spreading abroad uncorrected, should materially injure the cause of Social Reform. After one year's experience in this new mode of life we are sausfied that the principles, which under very unfavorable circumstances we have attempted to carry out are true, -- greatly favorable to the improvement of moral-,-to the elevation of the laboring class,-capable of reconciling the various interests of individuals, thereby establishing justice in their social relations and kindness in their intercourse.

But we find that coming from cities as most of us do, and consequently unused to the severe toil necessary to clear and subdue this wild land, the task is beyond our physical strength, and not being able to accomplish it profitably to ourselves and our friends, we have come to the conclusion that it was thexpedient to solicit any farther investment of capital, for the prosecution of the enterprise, and resolved on the sale of the property, payment of debts, and immediate winding up of the business.




