

The Whig Legislature.

The Legislature adjourned on Tuesday last at 12 o'clock, and the members have nearly all departed for "home, sweet home." It was, as we observed in Monday's paper, a *short, economical, WORKING SESSION*, and resulted in a saving to the State of not less than **TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS**—a matter of some importance to the poor and industrial classes of Pennsylvania who for years have been suffering from the extravagance and maladministration of Federal Locofocoism, and who are now burdened with onerous and unjust **LOCOFOCO TAXATION**. The Whig Legislature, during its short session of seventy-one days, transacted more important business than any of the lengthy, corrupt, and extravagant Locofoco Legislatures which have assembled here for years. We have shown the People what Whig Legislation and Whig economy can do. Give us a Whig administration, and we predict that Pennsylvania will soon be raised from her present prostrate condition, and elevated to a more lofty position among the Commonwealths of the Nation, than she has ever yet occupied. All honor is due to the Whigs for the ability and faithfulness with which they discharged their duty to their constituents, and their indefatigable exertions to promote the interests and prosperity of the Commonwealth.—Notwithstanding the frequent disgraceful and undignified attempts of the Locofoco minority to retard the progress of business and, if possible, lengthen the session, the Whigs indignantly frowned down all such proceedings, and moved forward in the discharge of their duties with a determination to despatch the business in as short a time, and with as little expense to the people as possible.

The **WHIG LEGISLATURE** of 1847, was in session only **SEVENTY-ONE DAYS**, and submitted **four hundred and fifty-nine bills and resolutions** to the Governor! The Locofoco session last year lasted **ONE HUNDRED AND SIX DAYS**, and but four hundred and sixty-one bills and resolutions were passed!—The Whig Legislature transacted as much business as the last Locofoco Legislature, and adjourned about **thirty-six days sooner**; thus saving to the State not less than **TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS!** Such are the good results flowing from Whig legislation and Whig economy; and if the tax-oppressed people of the State know their own interests, they will not only return the noble band of Whigs who so nobly discharged their duty during the recent session, but elect a Whig Governor, and abjure Locofocoism now and forever. Give us a Whig administration that will faithfully carry out Whig principles, and the restoration of our beloved Commonwealth to her former prosperity will speedily follow.—*Har. Intelligencer.*
