Suicides in the United States.

One of the papers which took notes, states that there were two hundred and two suicides committed in the U. States last year. Of this number 35 were by cutting the throat, 51 hanging, 29 shooting, 25 drowning, 22 poison, 10 jumping from a height, 6 stabbing, 6 under railroad cars. Of this number 59 were insane, 15 drunk, and 18 filled with remorse and despair.
