The North American publishes the following General Orders just issued from Head Quarters: GENERAL ORDERS.—No. 1.

ARMY OF OBSERVATION, East of the Rio Grande. The people of the United States, now forming the Grand Army, to Conquer a Peace and preserve it when obtained, under the banner of General ZACHARY TAYLOR, are ordered to join this Army of Observation, by divisions of States. The officers will, until further orders, beat every chapparral and drive out every guerilla from the locofoco ambuscade, and particularly guard the specie trains which are passing and are much exposed to robbers. In between four and five months this duty will have been accomplished; then after an armistice, terminating on the 4th March next, the Army of Occupation will make its head quarters at the White House.
