

**Ohio Legislature Organized.**

On Saturday the House of Representatives of Ohio effected an organization by the adoption of the following resolution offered by Mr. Townshend, a Free Soiler from Lorain county: Resolved, That the certificates of membership which were handed to Mr. Swift, (except those of Messrs. Spencer and Runyan,) [Whigs.] shall be passed to the Clerk's desk, and filed with those of the 42 on file—that, recognizing Mr. Leiter as chairman, for the purpose of organization, the first business transacted shall be the consideration of the following proposition:

That Messrs. Pugh and Pierce, [Democrats.] be, by their certificates, prima facie entitled to seats until their claims shall be finally decided upon their merits. On which resolution the said Pugh and Pierce shall not be entitled to vote, but the same shall be decided by the remaining 70 members. The vote on said resolution shall be decisive of the prima facie right of said Pugh and Pierce to seats; but nothing of the aforesaid proceedings shall be construed to interfere with the right of either Messrs. Spencer and Runyan, or Pugh and Pierce, to contest for seats after the organization.

Mr. Leiter, Democrat, acts as Chairman.  
Mr. McClure, Whig, acts as Clerk.

**Buckwheat Cakes.**

The American Agriculturist says:—The milk on which cakes are baked should never be touched with grease. Firstly, because it imparts a rancid taste to the cakes. Secondly, if cooking stove be used, it fills the kitchen, if in the whole house, with a smell of burnt grease—to say nothing of the parade, and boasting to one's neighbors, by betraying what we are to have for breakfast. Wash the griddle with hot soap suds; scour with dry sand, and then heated for use, rub it well with a spoonful of fine salt and a coarse cloth. It will then be ready to receive the cakes. After each cake is removed, the salt rubbing must be repeated. If the first does not succeed, try it again, and you will ever after follow this advice of an old housekeeper.

**Origin of the Cholera.**
