Not those isms which baffled malignity or piqued prejudice ascribes to him, but those isms which we, who know him, we (who have sat as his assistant, beside him for days and weeks, with family sorrows upon him, sufficient to crush a thousand hearts, sickness and death sealing the celestial eyes of his angel boy and paling the vermilion of his cherub lip in the darkness of the grave, yet forgetting his own griefs, to make the widow, and the orphan, and the stranger, and the homeless exile happy and hopeful) know to be his characteristics. Would that we could imitate him, in his purity and uprightness of character, in the benevolence of his big heart, in the sympathy he feels for the poorest creatures of God's Providence, in the ability with which he defends the cause of Liberty, Toleration, Justice and Truth. These are his prominent isms, and these are what we would imitate."
