We would not deny that Mr. Greeley may not have faults for we know he is human, and we imitate the faults of no man. There are doctrines which he advocates, which we have not studied so thoroughly as he has, and upon which we express no opinion; but even if he has faults, "his failings lean to virtues side." if he has isms, it is because he would pluck the thorns, by which suffering humanity is torn and lacerated, from the path of life; it is because he would restore, as far as the primeval curse would permit, that Eden of happiness to man, and mitigate the sorrows and sufferings of humanity which followed the first transgression; it is because he would alleviate the woes and sorrows of a fallen and degenerate world. - Would that we could bring such isms as he has in New Jersey. Not those isms which baffled malignity or piqued preindice ascribes to him, but those isms which we, who know him, we (who have sat as his assistant, beside him for days and weeks, with family sorrows upon him, sufficient to crush a thousand hearts, sickness and death sealing the celestial eyes of his angel boy and paling the vermillion of his cherub lib in the darkness of the grave, yet forgetting his own griefs, to make the widow, and the orphan, and the stranger, and the homeless exile happy and homeful know to be his characteristics. Would that we could imitate him, in his purity and uprightness of character, in the benevolence of his big heart, in the sympathy he feels for the poorest creatures of God's Providence, in the ability with which he defends the cause of Liberty, Toleration, Justice and Truth. These are his prominent isms, and these are what we would imitate."
