The Somerville Railroad Co.

Several large and valuable tracts of coal land, situated in the Lackawanna and Wyoming valleys have lately been purchased for this company. From the fact that these purchases have been made, it is inferred that the company will soon construct its railroad

This company is better known in this region as the Drinker company. By its charter it is authorized to make a road from the Lackawanna valley, at or near Harrison, through Cobb's Gap, to the Delaware river, a short distance above the Water Cap, at which point it is designed to intersect a railroad, for which a charter has been granted, to run across New Jersey and terminate in the vicinity of the city of New York.

At Harrison the Sommersville railroad, when finished, will form a junction with the Leggett's Gap railroad, now constructing from that point. through Susquehanna county, to the line of the N. York & Erie railroad in the valley of the Susquehanna river. The Leggett's Gap company own the railroad between Owego and Ithaca, thereby furnishing a connecting link between the Susquehanna valley and Cayuga Lake. Of course the Company must connect their two roads, which can be done either by extending their main railroad from Great Bend to Owego, or by making an arrangement for the use of the New York and Erie railroad between the two places. In either case the company will have the advantage of an unbroken line from Harrison to Ithaca, and will be able to supply central New York either from Binghamton by way of the Chenango canal, or from Ithaca by way of Cayuga Lake.
