This excited great indignation in the neighborhood where he lived, and four females who were heard to declare "such a wretch was not fit to live," and that "a coat of tar and feathers was too good for him," &c., were charged by Fisher with giving him great cause to fear that they would kill him. The women were of ably discharged.
