The States of Central America, through which this canal must be built if at all, are independent sovereignties, as much so as the United States; and, though not as powerful, they have the same right of self-direction within their own territory. If they choose to build a canal across the Isthmus for commercial purposes, or to grant the right of way to a chartered company, of way to a chartered compa whether chartered in Europe in this country, we do not see that they would invade any right of the United States. 

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
