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ANOTHER GYNERINE HORROR! CHAS. CROUSE, JR., FORMERLY OF THIS PLACE MEETS HIS DEATH AT AN OIL WELL IN MCKEAN COUNTY.

Mr. Chas. Crouse, Jr., of this town, received the sad intelligence last Wednesday, that his son Charles had been killed by the explosion of nitro-glycerine at an oil well in McKean county.

The body was placed in a coffin and shipped here, arriving Thursday evening, when it was found necessary to inter it immediately, which was done in the Catholic Cemetery in this place.

The following particulars of the explosion were taken from the Bradford, Pa. Evening Star of last Wednesday evening.

One of the most distressing and disastrous accidents recorded in oil region annals occurred at the well on the 21st inst., at a well on the roadside immediately west of Sawyer City, caused by an explosion of glycerine.

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Letter from Illinois. MANTENO, KANKAKEE CO., ILL., September 5th, 1881.
