

The Work Performed by the Western Union Co. at Cleveland.

CLEVELAND, September 29.—The service of the Western Union Telegraph Company from the arrival of Garfield's remains until the day after the funeral deserves mention. From the 24th to the 27th its facilities were severely taxed, but met the emergency in an exceedingly creditable manner, and such as called for commendations from newspaper correspondents and all others who had telegraphic business. So well was everything managed that no error occurred in transmission, notwithstanding at one time on Monday night over fifty thousand words per hour were sent on thirty-eight press circuits from this office, and the promptness with which business was despatched all who knew the immense amount of work being done. On Saturday, the 24th, 74,852 words were sent; on Sunday, 82,150; on Monday, the day of obsequies, 155,597; total for three days 282,599. Four fifths of this matter was transacted between nine at night and midnight. Besides the regular force here twenty-first class operators were sent here from Washington, Chicago, Indianapolis, Detroit and Toledo. In the receiving and delivery department more than double the ordinary number of messages were received and delivered each day, without increase of the regular force. All the employees took a personal interest in demonstrating that they could meet any emergency.

The Rural Land Owner on the Contrary.—Colonel Dan Murray of Hall's Station, Elko county, came to California in 1844, and may be said to have made the country pay him well for his time. He is now probably the largest private land owner on this continent. He has 4,000,000 acres of land in one body in Mexico, 60,000 in Nevada and 25,000 in California. His Mexican grant he bought four years ago for \$300,000, or five cents an acre. It is sixty miles long and covers a beautiful country of hill and valley, pine timber and meadow land. It comes within twelve miles of the city of Durango, which is to be a station on the Mexican Central. Mr. Murray raises wheat in especially fine land, and cattle on that in Nevada. He got 55,000 sacks last year, and ships 6,000 head of cattle a year right along.—Reno Gazette.
