CENTREVILLE Items and much other matter have to give way this week to proceedings of Republican State Convention and matters therewith connected.

The Women's Christian Association of this place has rented a fine room on Main street, south of Court House, and fitted the same up in good style.

Mrs. Nellie J. Murphy, a daughter of Massa Harbison of Indiana, died at her residence in Pittsburgh on the 5th inst. age 72 years.

The nomination of Hon. Thomas M. Marshall for Congressman-at-large was a capital stroke and a well executed breaking of the state programme at the State Convention.

Hon. WILLIAM T. DAVIES now nominated for Lieutenant Governor, and Hon. John M. Greer, now nominated for Secretary of Internal Affairs, by the late State Convention, are both members of the present State Senate, both being elected two years ago, for the term of four years.

COL. D. H. WALLACE, Senatorial delegate from this district, to the State Convention, voted on first ballot for Rawle, of Philadelphia, for Supreme Judge; direct instructions by Mercer County Convention, to vote for Maj. A. M. Brown, of Pittsburgh, notwithstanding E. L. Cunningham, representative delegate from this county, followed his example.

BEAVER FOR GOVERNOR. The nomination, by acclamation, in the State Convention of General Beaver for Governor was fitting and right, and will be approved by the people.

DEFEAT OF MAJ. BROWN. The one thing more regretted than all others is the failure by the State Convention to nominate Adam M. Brown for Judge of the Supreme Court.

THE PLATFORM. HARRISBURG, May 10.—The committee on resolutions presented the following platform and resolutions, which were adopted without discussion or comment of any kind, except that those resolutions which were inserted as reform sentiments elicited a great deal of interest from the delegates generally.

CONVENTION PROCEEDINGS. GEN. BEAVER'S SPEECH. Declaring That He Has Not Bargained For Any Political Influence. HARRISBURG, May 10. Following is General Beaver's speech to the convention after his nomination:

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Representatives of the Republicans of Pennsylvania: I am here in obedience to your summons, in answer to your request. The committee of your body who have conferred upon me have also informed me of your action in naming me as the candidate of the Republican party of Pennsylvania for the suffrage of the people in the approaching election of a Chief Magistrate of our Commonwealth.

I am not much of a politician. I have but little political experience, and consequently lay no claim to the sagacity which large experience brings, but I have faithfully and earnestly endeavored to learn in the preliminary canvass which has resulted in this nomination what the wishes of the masses of the Republican party were in regard to it.

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NO PLEDGES AS TO THE FUTURE. I have made no pledges to living men as to what my future course shall be. I can make none, now or hereafter, except this: In the approaching political campaign the harmony and success of the republican party shall be my one great object of desire and effort.

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Resolved, That as the sense of the great body of the Republican party of the State of Pennsylvania we declare: FIRST, That we unequivocally condemn the use of patronage to promote the personal political ends, and require that all offices bestowed within the party shall be upon the sole basis of fitness.

Resolved, That we also recommend the adoption of the following permanent rules for the holding of State Conventions and the conduct of the party: FIRST, That delegates to State Conventions shall be chosen in the manner in which candidates for the General Assembly are nominated, except in those districts composed of more than one county, in which conferees for the selection of Senatorial delegates shall be chosen in the manner aforesaid.

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which is but a repetition of that which is in former years has inspired every Convention of the party. An Independent by nature, an earnest Republican by conviction, and a thorough-going Pennsylvanian in every fibre of his body, he will worthily represent the State in the Forty-eighth Congress.

THE STATE CONVENTION.

Another Republican State Convention has come and gone. In some respects it was an interesting one and differed widely from former ones. While apparently still under the control of Senator Cameron, yet the proceedings show that much of his control has gone.

The ticket as a whole is composed of good men and is a strong one—and will be elected. The recommendations of the late conference committee, as to the future government of the party in the State, were all accepted and adopted by the Convention, with one single exception.

There will be a difference of opinion as to some of the other resolutions passed by the Convention, particularly the one endorsing the Administration of President Arthur. But all know how easily it is to pass resolutions and of what little value or meaning they often are.
