He stepped out from behind a car on Saturday night, just in time to be run over. On Saturday night two freight trains collided near Bald Ridge, smashing both engines and tenders. The engineers, firemen and brakemen jumped, and all escaped unhurt, excepting one fireman, who was slightly injured.

—Although experience is a dear school, the lessons learned by it are never forgotten. Some years ago the witty editor of one of our exchanges received a coat of tar and feathers from a renegade of fellow citizens, and that he yet remembers all the advantages and disadvantages of his unpleasant predicament is proven by his paper of last week in which he says that it is strange that people will suffer them, selves to be tortured by flies, fleas, mosquitoes and those nameless crawling Macheths of the night, who in their way of life, as a preventive of their pestiferous and noxious nature, are so active in their ways. It may not be generally known that the simple application of a coat of coal tar, spread evenly upon the body, will defeat the attacks of these troublesome insects, holding them fast by the limbs and mounts until the sleeper wakes, when he or she, as the case may be, may immediately proceed to disrobe himself in detail. The great advantage of this method is its durability and cheapness. The tar is not, as many suppose, difficult of removal from the cuticle, as it, together with portions of the epidermis, yields readily to several simple agents, such as lime, turpentine, benzine, or kerosene, or the application of a light match. The latter agent of removal cannot be recommended to highly to persons afflicted with constitutional lassitude and indisposition to exercise.
