Remarkable Phenomenon.

New Orleans, Feb. 4.—A remarkable physical phenomenon has been observed by Capt. W. L. Marshall, of the United States Engineers, at the Vicksburg and in charge of river improvement work at Lake Providence, La., for the Mississippi River Commission. Capt. Marshall, in a report just made to H. B. Haral, of the Commission in this city, communicated his discovery.
