Council met Tuesday evening at 8 p.m. with J. B. Black, Pres., and Councilmen Perrine, Forquer, Ziegler, Schenck, Halper, McJunkin, Stamm, Vogel, Harper, Alexander, Wingo, Solicitor, and Engineer McKeen, present.

The session continued till midnight and the most animated discussion was the one regarding the curbing of that part of Main street from the Diamond down to the Vogel House alley.

Some telegraph and telephone poles that interfere with the curbing were mentioned and the matter was referred to the paving committee.

Word was sent in that Mr. Meredith of the Water Co. was here and would like to have a proposition from Council, but as the Council has already made an offer of \$1000 a year for water for borough purposes, and as two of the fish tanks have already been connected with springs, and arrangements under way for connecting others in like manner, the Council did not feel like making another offer.
