Borough Business.

At a meeting of Council, Tuesday evening, a communication from Long & Doyle was read stating that Smith, Porter & Co. had positively refused to go on the \$5,000 bond individually, and suggesting that the Council retain \$5,000 from their pay for the street until they could secure ample surety, and the matter was referred to the Planning Committee and Solicitor. Why Smith, Porter & Co. should be willing to go on the bond as a corporation and not as individuals is not known; but it is said that the corporations of the country are now making a practice of issuing bonds, which are taken up by the individual members and entered as first liens on the plant, thus making the corporation practically irresponsible.

East Jefferson St. is now completed, and Long & Doyle asked that the assessment be made, the grading for W. Jefferson is completed and part of the curb is set, and the grading of Centre Ave. is completed.

The school house, and Long & Doyle were voted \$5,000—\$1,500 on West Jefferson, \$1,500 on Centre Ave.

Burgess Kennedy reported having collected \$561 for vehicle licenses during the week ending Sunday, 94 was paid to the Council for two months, to collect all, which he thinks ought to aggregate at least a thousand dollars, and Mr. Starr was retained at \$50 per month for two months, he to also investigate and make report to Council of any public nuisances he discovers. The ten policemen employed by the Burgess during Fair week were paid \$2 a day for four days each. Of the \$14 collected from the two Italians who were taken to the jail, \$4 was paid to Dr. Graham for sewing up a scalp wound.

Mr. Haffner brought up the matter of the Fair St. extension, which should be opened and drained as the people there now complain of the filth that has accumulated in the neighborhood. He said that Mrs. Baldwin was ready to open, and that she also wanted for some of the Councilmen to call and see her—somebody snickered and the snicker became general, then somebody laughed and the laugh became general, and there was considerable fun at Adam's expense—and the Councilmen of the 4th ward were authorized to attend to the business.

The Borough Solicitor was instructed to proceed vs. the P. & W. R. R. Co. regarding the overcrossed bridge, also to make report to Council as to the legal steps necessary to require the Railroad companies to erect gates and keep watchmen at the crossings of streets.

Treasurer Schenck reported having received \$700 from the Fair, his sketches attracted much attention. The wife of one of our most prominent merchants now has Bert engaged on a view of her home, intended to surprise the master at Christmas with the drawing.

Ira McFink, Esq. and J. F. Butler acted as Secretary of the meeting. They signed up 262 accounts, some of which contained a dozen items each, in short order and made but one mistake of one dollar.

The order on the grounds, considering the immense number present, Thursday, was remarkable. The management found it necessary to arrest but one man for disorderly conduct.

Salisbury Field won the first of Wm. Campbell's prizes for best temperance essays, Minnie Bell second, Lillie Kinzer third and Beulah Timblin fourth.

The Borough Burgess licensed no fairs for the streets, and collected no license from them on the Fair Grounds for fear they would come up on the streets evenings.

A. E. Gable, the Veterinary Surgeon, attending the wounded horse Grenoble, and the noble animal is doing well, and is probably recovered from his desperate wound. When he became frightened and attempted to jump the fence, he ran a breast splitting, sawed off square, into the best for a distance of a foot or more, when he broke off. Dr. G. extracted the piece of bone, and sewed up the wound, and as the horse was valued at \$500 he is being cared for carefully.
