

When any person is seized with sympoms of cholera, such as vomiting, purging, idden weakness, coldness, cramps or pasms, do not give them brandy or whiseen minutes to see whether or not there ecrease of sickness, cramps, &c., when if his neck. ecessary, he must take two drops as before, and repeat the dose every five min-ntes until twelve or fourteen drops have een taken. In administering this remedy ou must particularly obsrerve that if the atient takes anything of any kind, except old or iced water while the medicine is in-ended to operate, its whole effect will be lestroyed, for the least foreign medicine eutralizes the camphor, which is given to check vomiting and to produce a warm, ree perspiration. The use of cold or iced dings. vater is on the advice of the late celebraed and successful Dr. Piddock, of Lonlon, who always allowed his patients to rink cold or iced water, as it tends to pronote free perspiration, and also the abund-

ant discharge of yellow biles.

The patient must not be allowed to rise and expose him or herself to the slightest degree of cold and should not be tormented with baths, steamings or rubbing of any and, but permitted to lie still, as he will fall as leep when perspiration comes on, and after some hours will, with God's as istance, awake well, though weak and anguid and perhaps a little feverish, in which case he might get a dose, say a teapoonful of Gregory's powder or rhubarb r magnesia, with a little peppermint waer or weak salvolatile and water to wash t down, but must be kept quiet, taking only a little soup, broth or gruel for a day

Pay of the President.

There is a general idea that the president's salary of \$50,000 a year is all that he receives, and that, when compared with the salaries paid the sovereigns of Europe, this sum is not enough. This is a mistake. In addition to his salary, the president receives \$36,064 to pay the salaries of his clerks and subordinates. His rivate secretary has \$3,250; his assistant secretary, \$2,250; the stenographer gets \$1,800; each of five messengers \$1,200, the steward \$1,800, each of two doorkeepers \$1,200, while other employes are paid in proportion, down to the man who takes care of the fires, who receives \$864. In addition \$8,000 are allowed for incidentals, suck as stationery and carpets, \$12,500 for repairs and refirmishing, \$2,500 for fuel \$4,000 for the greenhouse and \$15,000 for the stables, gas and other incidentals. In all the president and his house cost the ountry over \$125,000.

The Professor figured at it awhile, and said it was plain that the courer traveled over fifty miles, but just how uch more he wouldn't undertake to say off-hand. The man from Gotham was not satisfied with Philadelphia professor's conlusion, so on reaching Washington he unted up Professor George Hill, the clerk to the House irrigation committee, and an expert in mathematics, who in turn, re ferred him to Professor Woodward, of the Coast and Geodetic Survey. His answer was sent in and appeared at the bottom of a long sheet of algebric equations. It was 60.3 miles. And still the New Yorker is not satisfied. Before giving up the \$100 he is going to have the opinion of the Proessor of Mathematics of Columbia College. 


