Kizina Allen vs. Robert and John Gallagher. On trial. The case of Schenk Bros vs. Deas Campbell was continued on account of sickness of defendant. J. X. K.

The will of J. M. McCann of Slipperhook twp. was probated, no letters; also will of James McKimney of Adams twp. and letters to Wm. McKimney and M. C. Black; also will of Campbell Hartley of Clinton twp., and letters to Wm. Logan and Thomas A. Hartley.

Letters of administration were granted to Jos. Rockenstein on estate of F. P. Baldani. H. H. Boyd had summons in ejectment issued vs. L. Glenn for lot in Springdale of First ward.

A rule was granted on Hugh McCray on the petition of C. E. Harmon et al. to settle title to real estate. The bondmen of E. Sheriff Redie petitioned to have the recognition on the bond cancelled, and the same will be considered by the court on Friday.

J. C. Donaldson, Albert Meckling and Henry Kahn were appointed appraisers of the estate of A. G. Mealy, who was assigned to J. B. Turner, for benefit of his creditors. The jury in the case of the Farmers' Oil Co. vs. Phillips could not agree. The case was tried with eleven jurors. They were much ill-served, and a jury is necessary in dealing radically and effectively with the problems presented.
