The Butler Co. General Hospital.

The new Butler County General Hospital building will be completed in about six weeks. Plasterers, carpenters and painters are putting the finishing touches on the interior of the building now. On the ground floor are two hot-air furnaces, laundry room, drying room and cellars. On the first floor are the anaesthetic and operating rooms, parlor, dining room and mensward. On the second floor are three private wards, the matron's room, obstetrical ward and womans ward. On the third floor are six bed rooms, kitchen, servants dining room and a general ward. A dum waiter runs from the

ward. A dum waiter runs from the ward. A dum waiter this from the eller up to the kitchen, which is in the northeast corner of the third floor. An elevator, designed principally for carry-ing patients, is placed about the middle of the building.
