Watsonville claims the biggest thing n earth in the shape of an apple-pack-ng house. It covers an area of 21,000 uperficial feet. One end of the huge shed abuts on the Southern Pacific track, while the other furnishes faciliies for the rapid unloading of the apacious spring wagons specia for this trade, with long flat beds and strong springs, to carry 100 boxes or nore filled with fruit loosely packed in the orchard. The "plant" required in the busines

of apple packing is primitive and inexpensive. The shed is simply a floorless shell, spacious and lofty. In this track are ranged longitudinally to receive small, four-wheeled flat cars, which make easy the work of unloading wagons and loading cars. The rest o e ground space is traversed by piece ntling, on which are ran d the exes of apples, ten tiers high. Benche or boxmakers and tables fitted with on clamps, operated by foot pressur for gently pressing down the bottoms of the full-packed boxes ready for the mailer, constitute the equipment inside

shaped hoppers, built of lumber, into which the refuse apples are thrown, to yield up their juice for cider vinegar. A store of this vinegar, sharpening in the sun's rays, fills many barrels, whos bungholes are stopped with wine bo es inverted.




