Under the law the distribution of the school funds of the state is made on the basis of the number of school teachers in each district, the number of scholars enrolled, and the number of taxables-names of voters-that appear on the assessors' lists. Philadelphia cannot falsify in the number of teachers employed in her public schools, or the number of pupils enrolled in those schools, but the Quay politicians do cheat when they pad the assessors' lists with 65,000 fraudulent names. This gives Philadelphia tens of thousands of dollars more than she is entitled to and cuts down just that much of the amount of money that should go to the other counties of the


