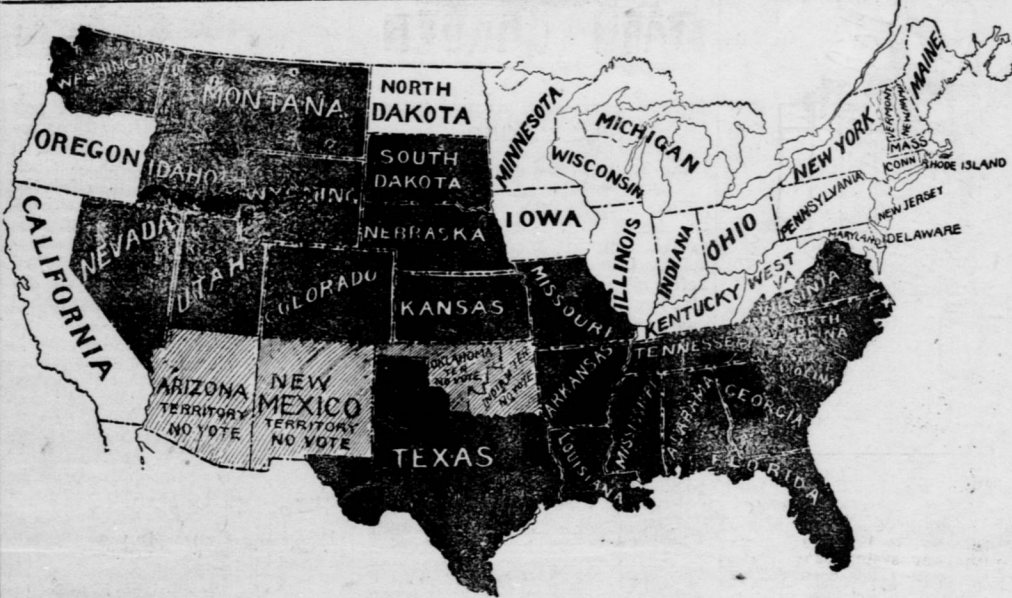

A Great Scheme. The Carnegie Steel Company lately concluded the chartering of four of the new style lake-ocean vessels from the Lake Superior Power Company and early in November it will send across the Atlantic to Wales with steel billets and tinplate bars. This marks the beginning of the aggressive attack of the Carnegie Company to invade the markets of the world, despite the refusal of the railroad combination to grant concessions in freight rates of exports to the seaboard and the shipments will be made in the history of the country where steel has been sent from Lake Erie ports to England without bulk having been broken in the transit.

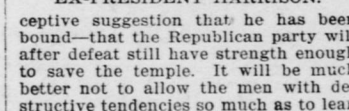

In the course of a recent interview in favor of the re-election of President McKinley, former President Harrison, among other things, said: 'His (Bryan's) election would, I think, throw governmental business affairs into confusion. We should not abdicate the election of a president who would, admittedly, if he could, destroy the gold standard and other things that we value even more upon the de-

ceptive suggestion that he has been bound—that the Republican party will defeat still will be carried through to save the temple. It will be much better not to allow the men with defective tendencies so much as to lean against the pillars.

The economic policies of the Republican party have been vindicated by the remarkable and general prosperity that has developed during Mr. McKinley's administration—succeeding a period of great depression. A change of administration would almost certainly renew conditions from which we have so happily escaped.

Obituary Notes. Rev. C. K. Stillwagon. Rev. C. K. Stillwagon died at his home in the borough of Valencia, on Sabbath, Oct. 7th, 1900 at 1:15 A. M.

Brother Stillwagon was born in Fayette county Pa., in 1834. He was educated by the Methodist Protestant conference in 1856, and was ordained by the Pittsburgh conference of this church in 1858. As pastor he labored in the Susquehanna, Brownsboro, Ohio, Berthel, Elizabeth, Wellsburg, Trumbull, Bortwell, and other churches.

He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church. In his ministry of 38 years he received fifteen hundred and eighty one personal conversions. His wife was Caroline Crossland, who bore him five sons, Archie, who died in his youth, Henry, George, Dunbar and Westfall, both of whom had served with him in the conference almost the 38 years, one very touching.
