



ROTATION OF CROPS.

There are certain definite advantages o be gained from practicing the rota-

of extracting plant food from soils. For stance, it has been shown that certain of the leguminous plants can appropriate phosphoric acid from mineral phosphates in a much greater degree han the cereals. In the English exeriments of Lawer and Gilbert it was found that certain root crops were much more dependent than cereals are on artificial manuring with phosphates Again, some plants can draw food from a greater depth than others by reason of their having longer roots. Where certain crops are grown continuously upon a given field, their in

sect enemies are more likely to accumulate in dangerous numbers that where a rotation of crops is practiced. Plants grown without interruption upon the same land are more likely to uffer injury from certain fungous and bacterial diseases than where other ants are periodically introduced which not serve as favorable host plants for the propagation of injurious fungi r bacteria which cause the trouble. By a rational rotation of crops the land is kept in far better tilth than would otherwise be the case. The importance of the presence of organic matter in process of decomposition is often far greater than is generally suposed. Thus the occasional turning u der of a grass or clover sod or the plowing in of a green crop is generall; plowing in of a green crop is generally followed by marked physical benefit. By this procedure fresh food is intro-duced into the soil for the bacteria and fungt, many of which are highly beneficial aside from their direct aid in ef-fecting the decomposition of the vegetable matter. Recent investigation are claimed to indicate that the solu-bility and hence the assimilability of oone meal may be materially increased by certain bacteria, which in turn ar endent for their existence upon the sence of a proper food supply.

Under a judicious system of rotation weeds are often eliminated from the farm more readily than where certain crops are grown continuously. Furthermore, by the subdivision of a farm into several fields each following a diff ferent rotation, or even if following but one rotation in such a manner as to give a variety of crops each year, the labor of the farm is better distributed than otherwise, and the danger of se-vere losses owing to unfavorable climatic conditions in a given year is di-

A successful rotation tested at the Rhode Island station is a short one Knode Island station is a short one, covering a period of but three years. Potatoes are planted on a clover sod. After they are harvested the soil is thoroughly fitted for winter rye, which is then sown in September so as to insure a good start before the advent of winter. The following spring common red clover seed is sown, preferably late in March or very early in April. This is done after the old snow and ice have nelted and if possible after a light fall f snow. This helps one to make sur of supplying the entire area with seed This manner of seeding to clover is usually far more successful here than late summer or fall seeding. The rye is cut for the grain and straw, though if preferred or deemed more profitable in special cases it might be cut green for fodder or for bedding. The succeeding year the clover is cut for hay and is followed the next season by potatoes ond course of the rotation. The sam rotation has been advocated by Mr. T. B. Terry, except that he uses winter




