



FALL PASTURE.

ape, Turnips, Wheat, Oats and Rye Are All Crops to Be Considered. Rape sown as late as Sept. 1 will Rape sown as late as Sept. 1 will furnish pasture for hogs, advises the Kansas station. Sow Dwarf Essex rape, five pounds per acre broadcast or three pounds per acre drilled. It will do to feed in six weeks after seeding. An acre will pasture 10 to 20 hogs, and as seed costs only 10 to 15 cents per pound the cost is light. Rape is a fair pasture for cattle, but some dry feed must be given with it to prevent scouring. It takes a heavy frost to kill rape, so that it furnishes late pasture, and Kansas farmers should sow a large acreage of it.

Turnips should also be sown largely.

Intensive Culture of Forage Crops. Intensive rather than extensive cul re should be the motto of the pro ducer of forage crops. Six cords of barnyard manure may be considered a reasonable application to the acre. Frequently when the supply is limited We use only the purest drugs it is convenient to apply three or four cords to the acre and supplement with commercial fertilizers. In such cases the following mixture is suggested: Nitrate of soda, 100 pounds; acid phosphate, 100 pounds; muriate of potash

In the case of wheat and vetch, grass and clover or clover sown in August or September it is advisable to apply the barnyard manure at the time of seed-ing and top dress in the early spring mg and top dress in the early spring with the fertilizer mixture. If clover is grown by itself use only 50 pounds of attrate of soda. Clover sick land is very much benefited by the additional application of 1,000 pounds of slaked lime to the acre.—J. B. Lindsay, Massachusetts.

Late Celery In New Jersey. The Kalamazoo (Mich.) celery; ship-ped east in bunches of a dozen hearts each, has rendered a change in mode of selling advisable. While a portion of growers still bundle flat, four or five stalks together, the largest growers sell in lots of from 30,000 to 50,000 stalks to the dealers in market, who trim all outer leaves, leaving only hearts, and bunch these for sale. The value of celery for market purposes to-day is judged by its heart. Jersey celery is of finer quality than either Michigan or California, so a Jerseyman as-

During the burning of the Standard Oll company's tanks at Bayonne, N. 
