The Schley Verdict.

The report of the Schley Court of Inquiry was promulgated by Secretary Long last Friday. There are two reports. Admiral Benham and Ramsey concur in the first, which is signed by Dewey also as a matter of form.

The majority opinion finds in brief that Admiral Schley should have proceeded with the utmost dispatch to Cienfuegos and maintained a close blockade; that he should have endeavored to obtain information of the Spanish squadron there; that he should have obeyed the department's orders; that he should have endeavored to capture the Spanish vessels in Santiago; that he did not do his utmost to destroy the Colon.
