Flood Notes. The Allegheny river reached flood stage last Friday afternoon, with 25 feet of water above the normal stage and 27 feet above the stage of 1903.

At Sharpsville, Mercer county, Saturday afternoon the bridge was washed away by the flood, and the loss in the crowd was estimated at \$200,000.

The Allegheny Coal Co.'s mine near Cheswick in the West Penn was the scene of an explosion, last Monday morning, which killed nearly all the miners, estimated at 300 in number.
