FARM GARDEN

A FRUIT EVAPORATOR.

A Cheap and Effective Arrangement For Bleaching and Drying Apples.

The desirability of a cheap, effective evaporator for utilizing inferior grades of orchard fruit has been felt by farmers and fruit men in all our orchard growing sections. A drying house of this sort enables the grower to utilize fruit that would otherwise go to waste.

In case of later rot the diseased fruit may be used up before it contaminates surrounding fruit. An evaporator, simple in design and suited for practical purposes, was described recently by L. A. Goodman of the Missouri station, who has had wide experience in apple growing and evaporating. Mr. Goodman states that all that is required are a plain frame building made of boarding well battened, a slatted upper floor about six feet above the ground for the fruit and a stove on the lower floor. Almost any old, plain building may easily be converted into an evaporator, and cheap, rough sheds may be built for the fruit and piling machines. This is all that is needed except the bleacher. The building should be about 24 feet wide and twelve feet to the eaves and will require no bottom floor. It should be made of good, dry 1 by 12 inch boxing twelve feet long and six feet wide. The fruit which should be placed about six feet above the ground and be 2 by 6 inches and twelve feet long, resting upon a support in the middle of the building. A building 12 by 12 feet or 16 by 16 feet would be large enough for most farmers or fruit men.

The upper floor should be made of six inch square and beveled to prevent the fruit from clogging. These are nailed to the joists three-eighths to half an inch apart to allow the hot air to pass up through the fruit which is spread on this floor. The whole space on this floor should be used for drying. Entrance to the room is by stairs on the outside. On the ridge of the roof will be necessary to carry off the moist hot air. Two large stoves with large drums and plenty of pipe on the ground floor and answer for the furnace and if the drying room is but 12 by 12 feet or 16 by 16 feet one stove will be sufficient. The stoves should be so arranged that they may be fired from the outside. Fruit

THE VALUE OF MULCHING.

Results Obtained With the Potato Crop—in the Farm Garden.

Several of the experiment stations have carried out experiments in mulching potatoes. Favorable results this time the southern sections of the spring wheat states have sustained serious damage, and more is threatened. The northern spring wheat crop will equal that of last year if the frost holds off until Aug. 15.

Winter Wheat—Average decrease in yield 7 per cent as compared with last year.

Corn—Average increase in yield 16 per cent.

Outs—Average increase in yield 19 per cent.

Rye—Average increase in yield 11 per cent.

Berley—Average increase in yield 20 per cent.

bins and piling tables are arranged in a lean-to shed against the main building.

After slicing the apples they are dropped into trays made 3 by 3 feet of galvanized wire and at once put into the bleaching house, where the fumes of sulphur soon bleach the bruised and discolored. As soon as bleached the trays of fruit are carried to the drying room and emptied on the floor.

Wheat Seeding.

In regard to wheat the Oklahoma experiment station finds, first, the application of barnyard manure will increase the yield materially; second, thorough cultivation should not be overlooked; third, the selection of good seed is an important consideration.

A plan of experiment in seeding has been made a seeding the 15th of September for early seeding, the 10th of October for medium seeding and the 15th of November for late seeding. Red Russian wheat was used in the experiment, with the following results:

Yield per acre 1904.	Average Bush-Tons per acre.
Early seeding—10.41	45
Medium seeding—12.24	48
Late seeding—10.41	45

*Average for four years.

Apple Storage.

Apple storage is not always profitable. It is an insurance against the premature deterioration of the fruit, but when the picking season is unusually hot and there are delays in getting the fruit into storage the subsequent losses are sometimes very heavy. On the other hand, the autumn may be unusually cool and favorable for storing large quantities of apples in common storage. As a result the markets are well supplied with this fruit through the winter, causing the cold storage stock to be held back all the way to the season, when it has to be rushed on the market and sold at a sacrifice on account of the approaching warm weather and the free use of southern early fruits.

PROMISING CROP REPORTS.

Wheat Excepted, All Grain Crops Show a Gain Over Last Year.

Preliminary returns to the Bureau of statistics indicate a winter wheat crop of about 223,400,000 bushels, or an average of 12.3 bushels per acre, as compared with 12.3 bushels per acre last year as finally estimated.

The average condition of spring wheat on Aug. 1 was 57.5 as compared with 53.7 last month, 77.1 on Aug. 1, 1903; 80.7 at the corresponding date in 1902 and a ten year August average of 81.2.

Rust has made its appearance in a number of counties in the northwest, but except as to South Dakota it is chiefly in late or supplemental reports that reference is made to it, and it is evidently too early to estimate definitely the extent of the damage resulting from it.

The average condition of the oat crop on Aug. 1 was 86.6 as compared with 80.8 last month, 79.5 on Aug. 1, 1903; 80.4 at the corresponding date in 1902 and a ten year August average of 82.7.

The proportion of the oat crop of last year still in the hands of farmers is estimated at 5.4 per cent as compared with 7.4 per cent of the crop of 1902 in farmers' hands one year ago.

The average condition of barley on Aug. 1 was 85.1 against 88.5 one month ago, 83.4 on Aug. 1, 1903; 90.2 at the corresponding date in 1902 and a ten year average of 83.2.

The average condition of spring rye on Aug. 1 was 81.5 as compared with 80.8 one month ago, 87.2 on Aug. 1, 1903; 90.5 at the corresponding date in 1902 and a ten year average of 86.2.
