THE HARRISVILLE NUISANCE.

The Harrisville Nuisance.

Has William Brown complied with the sentence of the court in ordering him to abate a nuisance? That is the question which brought the town council, board of health, some of the doctors and several other prominent citizens of Harrisville into court Friday. Last September Brown was returned by the grand jury for maintaining a nuisance in the shape of a slaughter house on his property in Harrisville. Mrs. Caroline Morrow, whose dwelling is near the slaughter house, was the complainant. Brown plead guilty, paid the costs and said he would abate the nuisance. Mrs. Morrow claims he did not, and that the stench from the slaughter house forced her to move from Harrisville to Avalon. Brown was haled into court on a rule granted to show cause why he had not complied with the sentence. The borough officials were divided on the subject, some of the board of health and councilmen swearing that Brown had abated the nuisance satisfactorily, and others that he had not. The people of the town have taken sides on the case and the bad blood engendered almost equals the bad smell. Judge Galbreath did not render a decision at the hearing.
